SAID NUSEIBEH'S LONG ASSOCIATION with Ruth Bernhard-"She's like a fairy godmother to me," he saysbegan 14 years ago when the two met at a workshop Nuseibeh was attending in his hometown of San Francisco. "Michael Kenna had been working for her previously," he says, "though his [photography] business had begun to take off and she was looking for a new printer. After we met at the workshop, I later showed her some of my work at the behest of Joe Folberg of Vision

Gallery. Ruth gave me several negatives to print as a test, and that's how we got started."

Known for striking nudes shot in strong lights and darks, Bernhard originally used Agfa Portriga for her pictures or "any other paper that would deliver a warm tone," says Nuseibeh. He says he now prints her work on Ilford Multigrade warm tone. using Dektol developer and giving finished prints a relatively strong selenium toning, with a bath using 1 part toner to 40 parts water.

He says of working with Bernhard, "I feel I'm always allowed to translate, and that as my skills grow and sensitivities deepen, I'm free to apply that to better interpret Ruth's work."
